IMPACT ON CALIFORNIA'S BABY BOOMERS

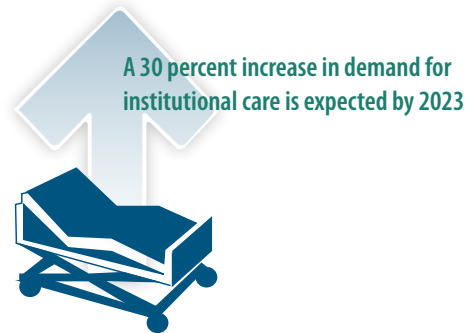

Projected increases in demand for long-term care suggest that seniors either will not be able to obtain the care they need or face delays in obtaining care. Additionally, individuals with long-term care needs may increasingly need to rely upon family members for care or receive no care at all if their needs cannot be supported by the state.



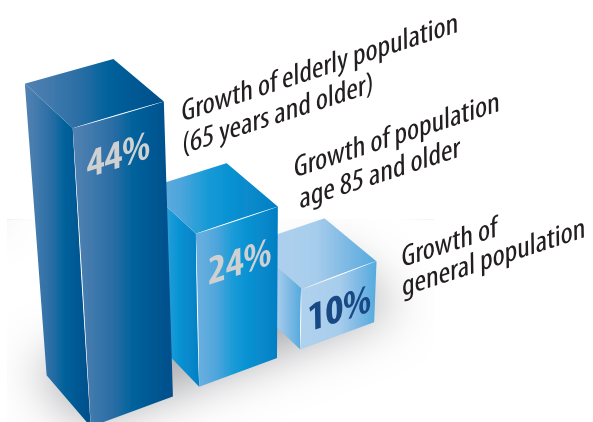
